




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## 1. What did we do?

We talked to individuals living in recovery residences that serve people taking medications for opioid use disorder (MOUD) to understand the impact that these homes had on their recovery journeys.

# 2. Why is this important?

People taking MOUD often do not have access to recovery housing services and can face discrimination from service providers and their peers. They may leave recovery and treatment settings because of stigma, feelings of shame, and feelings that their recovery is "less than" compared to others who do not take MOUD.

## 3. What did we find?

Recovery residents serving people taking MOUD provide inclusive, non-judgmental recovery environments where residents develop supportive relationships with others. Residents felt empowered to embrace their recovery journey that included MOUD.

### 4. What next?

Recovery residences that include people taking MOUD are important and needed to ensure everyone feels supported in their recovery journey.
