Strategic Action Plan for the Health System



- Community Needs Assessment/Dekalb County IPLAN
- High priority areas: obesity, cardiovascular disease, high cholesterol and blood pressure, cancer
- Community Benefit Plan for Dekalb County (Health System supporting CATCH)

CATCH Pilot at Tyler Elementary School

- Dekalb Leadership Academy Project-had to be sustainable
- Principal support at Tyler and 12 community leaders involved to implement the program (highest free and reduced % school)
- Implemented with fidelity of all 4 CATCH components
- Changed the culture of the school-Staff and student support





Strengths and Challenges of the 1st Year

Challenges:

Lack of educational tools and funding



- Lack of classroom teacher and administrative understanding of CATCH components
- Scheduling of NIU students at each of the schools
- Needing more "on site" support for CATCH at the Schools (PE teachers involvement)

Summer 2013....Revamping the CATCH program in the Dekalb Schools

- Identified grant funding through the We Choose Health grant
- CATCH Academy for classroom teachers
- Connecting with district leadership
- Lesson planning and prioritizing



Fall 2013....Revamping the CATCH program in the Dekalb Schools

- Preparing educational CATCH bins
- NIU CATCH Training
- CATCH teaching lab hours for NIU students



- CATCH onsite Liaisons at each school
- Discipline specific scheduling at each school
- Incorporating Pre and Post CATCH testing
